Study Abroad Goals Endorsed for OSU

OSU has set a long-term goal of all students receiving an international experience prior to graduating, according to Interim OSU System CEO and President Marlene Strathe.

"The opportunity to study abroad not only enriches the student's educational experience, but is vital for American economic competitiveness and especially for America's future diplomacy and security," Strathe said.

She initiated a Study Abroad Committee last year following a Faculty Council recommendation to increase OSU study abroad numbers. While the long-term goal is 100 percent of graduates having a significant study abroad experience, OSU has established a five-year objective of 25 percent participation. Recommendations

Osteopathic Medicine, Occupational Education Programs Highly Ranked

The OSU Center for Health Sciences College of Osteopathic Medicine and the College of Education's occupational studies graduate program were ranked among the best in the nation by the U.S. News & World Report's "America's Best Graduate Schools 2008."

The CHS ranked 14th in rural medicine and 30th in primary care, marking the seventh consecutive year the OSU medical school has been ranked. OSU Medicine ranked 20th in rural medicine and 45th in primary care in the 2007 report

The occupational education studies graduate program tied for 10th place with Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, in vocational/technical programs. This program has made the Top 10 since 1998.

Rankings are determined by deans from across the nation based upon quality assessment, student selectivity, faculty resources and research activity. also called for establishing specific actions and support to reach the objectives.

"Today's universities have a responsibility to provide students the knowledge and skills they need to be active and contributing members of the global community," said Gerry Auel, Study Abroad coordinator

Jim Hromas, OSU International Education and Outreach director, applauded the Faculty Council for taking the initiative to set priorities in this area.

OSU has exchange programs on five continents and in more than 30 countries. OSU students have studied abroad on six of the seven continents.

Center for Rural Health Provides Colonoscopies

A new Colorectal Cancer Screening Project, a collaborative effort between the OSU Center for Rural Health and the Oklahoma State Department of Health, provides free colonoscopies to qualifying individuals.

The colonoscopies are performed by the OSU-CHS Department of Surgery at the OSU Medical Center. Oklahoma Senators Johnnie Crutchfield and Debbie Leftwich secured funding from the state legislature to fund the free colonoscopies, and their goal is to make colonoscopy screening available to Oklahomans regardless of their ability to pay.

Buried Treasure Opened

An 80-year-old time capsule placed in the Dairy Science Building cornerstone in 1928 was opened on March 28.

Special guests at the ceremony were Oklahoma A&M President Henry G. Bennett's son Judge Tom Bennett and grand-daughter Elizabeth Bennett of Oklahoma City. Tom Bennett was 8-years-old when the building was dedicated.

The time capsule revealed copies of state papers, the O'Collegian, Stillwater Daily Press, a college catalog, a Masonic coin, keys to another dairy building that had been replaced and a list of those at the dedication ceremony.

Robert Whitson, OSU vice president, dean and director of the Division of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources, said optimism about agriculture in 1928 was great. "It was a golden era of agriculture," he said. An interdisciplinary science research facility will be built on the site.

Approval Recommended For OSU-OKC Programs

The Higher Learning Commission's visiting site team recommended approval for a bachelor's degree offered on the OSU-OKC campus, the bachelor of technology in emergency responder administration, according to OSU-OKC President Jerry Carroll.

They also unanimously recommended for approval five existing associate degree programs to be offered totally online – healthcare administration, business technologies, management and two police science degrees. The team's recommendations will be considered for final approval by the NCA Commission this summer.

"The review team was very complimentary of our facilities as they met with students, faculty, staff and community leaders," Carroll said. "They were especially impressed with the enthusiasm of everyone about our institution and the very bright future that lies ahead for OSU-Oklahoma City."

Smallwood, Timmons Receive Udall Scholarships

OSU students Sara-Jane Smallwood and Cortney Timmons are among 80 students from 60 colleges and universities selected to receive Morris K. Udall Scholarships.

Smallwood and Timmons, both students in OSU's College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources, are the university's fourth and fifth recipients of the national honor since the scholarship program began in 1996.

"The entire OSU system is so proud of Cortney and Sara-Jane," said Interim OSU System CEO and President Marlene Strathe. "These two students are perfect examples of the result of hard work on their part and the high caliber of instruction all students receive at OSU."

The Udall Scholars were selected from 434 candidates nominated by 221 colleges and universities on the basis of leadership potential, academic achievement and commitment to careers in the environment, health care or tribal public policy. Each will receive one-time stipends of up to \$5,000.

Smallwood, a Clayton agricultural communications and American Indian studies junior, is a member of the Choctaw Nation. She hopes to work with federal and tribal governments on issues related

December Graduate Receives NSF Fellowship

Elizabeth Casey of Tulsa, a biosystems engineering major who received her degree in December, was recently named the recipient of a National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellowship.

Currently a master's student in agricultural and biological engineering at Purdue University, she will receive a \$30,000 stipend each year for the three-year program, along with a \$10,000 tuition allotment.

Her research proposal was on improving ethanol yield from lignocellulosic material--basically, producing ethanol from agricultural waste such as corn stover.

to agriculture and environmental issues, specifically water.

Timmons, an Ada biosystems and agricultural engineering sophomore, hopes to design agricultural systems and programs that protect and sustain the quantity and quality of water, soil and other natural resources, while developing techniques to make agricultural operations more environmentally friendly.

The Morris K. Udall Scholarship and Excellence in National Environmental Policy Foundation was authorized by congress in 1992 to honor Congressman Udall's legacy of public service.

OSU-Tulsa Student Named Truman Scholar

Iraq war veteran Matt Stiner, Broken Arrow political science major, was named the first student from the OSU-Tulsa campus and only the 10th from OSU to be selected as a Truman Scholar, one of the nation's most prestigious national honors.

The \$30,000 scholarship is awarded to students who are entering public service and is awarded to only about 75 U.S. college juniors every year.

"The entire OSU community is proud of what Matt has accomplished for his country and in the classroom," said OSU Interim System CEO and President Marlene Strathe. "His many accomplishments, leadership and vision for the future are inspiring. He is yet another example of the elite work done by students at OSU."

In addition to the scholarship, Stiner also will receive leadership training, career and graduate school counseling and special internship opportunities within the federal government. Following graduation, he plans to pursue a master's degree in public administration from the University of Georgia.

Smith Receives Fulbright Grant

Matthew Smith of Tecumseh will be headed to Indonesia later this year after landing a Fulbright grant to serve as an English teaching assistant there.

Smith will graduate in May with a master's degree in international studies.

No stranger to overseas travel, he spent two years in Ecuador with the Peace Corps and currently serves as the organization's recruiter in Stillwater and Langston.

Sponsored by the U.S. Department of State and administered by the Institute for International Education, the Fulbright program offers research scholarships and teaching assistantships abroad for students and faculty.

The School of International Studies houses OSU's Fulbright Information Center. Robert Graalman, Steve Hallgren and Gerry Auel are on the university's Fulbright advisory committee.

Rollins Receives Lifetime Achievement Award
