Message from Marlene Strathe

We have had an excellent fall semester and I was pleased recently to celebrate the accomplishments and contributions of a number of Oklahoma State University faculty and staff members at the Fall Convocation.

The Regents teaching and research awards were presented along with

staff, faculty and administrator service recognitions. International programs and outreach efforts were also recognized. The 2007 eminent faculty award recipient and the newly appointed Regents professors were honored and Dean Pat Knaub received the "Loyal and True" Award. The OSU community is indeed fortunate to have so many outstanding individuals as part of our university.

Planning is under way for the upcoming legislative session and the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education has identified five legislative agenda priorities: 1) maximizing state appropriations, 2) increasing student financial aid, 3) obtaining matching funds for endowed chairs/professorships, 4) continuing investments in research initiatives, and 5) establishing a grant program for economic development initiatives.

OSU has begun the internal process of budget development for FY '09 as well identifying our priorities for federal funding. The Capitol Hill Consulting Group has been retained to assist OSU in

the federal appropriation and agency arena. The Group is headed by former Oklahoma congressman Bill Brewster.

Enhancing the salaries of our faculty and staff, addressing mandatory costs, increasing available start-up monies for newly hired faculty, and providing additional student support services remain among our highest priorities.

The OSU Foundation has announced another record-setting fund-raising year with gifts totaling more than \$85 million for the fiscal year ending June 30. Fund-raising success was punctuated by several record-breaking totals secured in planned giving, endowments and annual giving.

We are pleased the Information Technologies division at OSU-Okmulgee was one of three programs in the nation to receive the ABET President's Award for Diversity. OSU is committed to preparing students to think and act in ways that will embrace and promote a more inclusive society and we commend OSU-Okmulgee on this high honor.

I also want to extend sincere gratitude and congratulations to our students and others who made the OSU 2007 Homecoming another huge success. The students' charitable work, the Walkaround, the parade, the thrilling victory over Kansas State, and various other events made it a perfect week for our many alumni and friends.

Officials Ring Bell to Mark Old Central Restoration

Oklahoma Historical Society Executive Director Bob Blackburn joined OSU officials and guests Oct. 10 to ring the Old Central bell marking the dedication and official start of a \$7 million restoration and renovation of the 113-year old building.

The current restoration will essentially give Old Central a new foundation. When completed, the renovated building will house the OSU Honors College and continue to be the home of the Oklahoma Museum of Higher Education.

"This building stands as a symbol of just how far higher education has come in the state of Oklahoma," said Blackburn.

Originally called the College Building,

Old Central was the first permanent structure at Oklahoma A&M College. It opened its doors in 1894 and the initial cost was \$25,000. Through the years, the building has been the location for the president's office, university office space, classes, commencement, the student newspaper and the university's first print shop. Classes were last held in Old Central in 1921, and it was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1971.

Renovation of the 11,088 square foot building is funded through the Oklahoma State Regents of Higher Education capital lease program and is scheduled to be completed by December of 2008.

OSU Begins Campus Energy Conservation

A comprehensive energy conservation initiative expected to save more than \$22 million over the next seven years is well under way throughout the OSU System.

Best College Buy

OSU has been named among "America's 100 Best College Buys for 2007 - 2008" by an independent research and consulting firm. The annual study by Institutional Research and **Evaluation, Inc. includes only colleges** that manage to provide the highest quality education at the lowest cost. The Washington Monthly also has ranked OSU among the best U.S. college and university programs this year. OSU was the only school from Oklahoma included on the magazine's list, which is considered an alternative to the U.S. News & World Report rankings.

Many building environmental systems already have been adjusted to limit consumption, and the next implementation stages of the program developed in partnership with Energy Education Inc. will ask all faculty, staff and students for action.

"EEI's program in no way requires us to compromise the university's research and education mission. We will not limit laboratory operations or disrupt essential activities," said Interim OSU System CEO and President Marlene Strathe. "Most of the changes, such as establishing building heating and cooling schedules according to seasons and times of occupancy, will go largely unnoticed."

The program, including standardized best practices and guidelines that promote responsible energy management, is designed to limit utility energy consumption primarily when buildings and spaces are unoccupied.

War Dog Promise Fulfilled After Almost 54 Years

On Oct. 19 in Stillwater, Lt. Col. Lorren L. Perdue, USAF Ret., made good on a promise he made nearly 54 years ago involving his flying companion and best friend, Ace, a black Australian Shepherd War Dog.

Perdue, a World War II pilot, met Ace in New Guinea in 1943 and raised and trained him to be a War Dog using an Army K-9 training manual.

Ace became the mascot of the 66th Troop Carrier Squadron, 403rd T.C. Group, and was the only War Dog who flew with his pilot trainer. They logged more than 500 hours in the Southwest Pacific, and at the war's end, Ace was shipped to Perdue's parents' home in Alabama where they were reunited in 1945.

Following World War II, Perdue was assigned to the Air Force ROTC staff at Oklahoma A&M College, and he and Ace continued to fly in Air Force and civilian aircraft. Ace accumulated more than 1,000 hours of flight time.

In November 1953, Ace suffered a heart attack while pheasant hunting near Stillwater, and died the next day.

"Mr. Hoyt Walkup, former Air Force pilot and Stillwater airport manager at the time, assisted me in burying Ace in an Army footlocker under the airport tetrahedron (wind T) in front of the airport terminal building," Perdue said.

Perdue was joined by friends, alumni and OSU representatives from the Center for Veterinary Health Sciences to commemorate the life of this military War Dog.

North Classroom Building Breaks Ground Sept. 14

Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education Chancellor Glen Johnson joined OSU and Northern Oklahoma College officials Sept. 14 to break ground on the North Classroom Building. The \$14 million facility is partially funded through the Oklahoma Higher Education Capital Bond Program.

The facility will include two 116-seat auditoriums, 14 classrooms, a student success center and coffee shop. One floor will be occupied by the Northern Oklahoma College Gateway Program.

The building is one of the \$165 million in academic projects currently under way at OSU, and should open in 2009.

New facilities and improvements to current buildings are part of the \$826 million campus master plan that will transform OSU over the next five to seven years, making it more competitive in academics, campus life and athletics.

OSU-OKC Physical Plant Opens

OSU-Oklahoma City President Jerry Carroll and OSU-OKC Advisory Board members recently marked the opening of the new OSU-OKC Physical Plant Building at a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

The 10,500 square foot building houses the Grounds and Facility Maintenance departments and provides campus work

and storage areas.

Funding for the building came from the 2005 Higher Education Capital Bond Issue and institutional funds. The \$475 million for construction and \$25 million bond bank allows the state's colleges and universities to better meet the needs of more than 235,000 students.

University Health Services Reaccredited

OSU University Health Services has passed a series of rigorous and nationallyrecognized standards for the provision of quality health care to achieve accreditation by the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care, according to Steve Rogers, UHS director.

Accreditation underscores the UHS long-standing commitment to provide the highest possible levels of quality care. This is the fifth consecutive three-year accreditation award earned by UHS, dating

back to 1995.

Ambulatory health care organizations seeking accreditation undergo an extensive on-site, peer-based survey of facilities and services.

UHS is the ambulatory care facility on the OSU campus for students who become ill or injured. With a staff or 40 that includes six physicians and a physician associate, 13 nurses and other health professionals, UHS handles more than 26,000 medical visits per year.

OSU Center for Rural Health Receives Awards

Blue Cross Blue Shield of Oklahoma Champions of Health program named the OSU Center for Rural Health as a recipient of its Champion of Public Health Award and the Rural Health Association of Oklahoma has named it the Rural Organization of the Year for 2007, according to William J. Nanotechnology Receives \$598,000 NSF Award

The National Science Foundation has awarded \$598,000 to OSU-Okmulgee and the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education to boost a joint program called the Oklahoma Nanotechnology Initiative.

The funds will be used to help develop awareness among middle and high school students about career opportunities the field will offer and assist in the development of the high tech labs needed to offer hands-on learning experiences.

Nanotechnology is the term used to describe the process of manufacturing at the molecular level. Before 2010, the market for nanotechnology products and services is estimated to reach \$1 trillion in the U.S. economy and will require from 800,000 to two million new workers. Most of these workers will need at least two-year postsecondary degrees.

OSU Foundation Reports Recent New Gifts to System

The OSU Foundation has announced the following gifts to the OSU System:

--A \$500,000 Chesapeake Energy Corporation donation to fund up to 12 scholarships annually in the Boone Pickens School of Geology and up to eight scholarships in the College of Engineering, Architecture and Technology. This raises Chesapeake's scholarship commitment on the Stillwater campus to \$1 million. Also, the Chesapeake Rural Scholars Program established in 2003 will award twenty \$2,500 scholarships during the 2007-08 academic year.

--ETS-Lindgren has given a gift of a Smart 80 reverberation chamber valued at \$275,000 to OSU's School of Electrical and Computer Engineering, which will enhance the university's national reputation in the area of electromagnetic compatibility. The Smart 80 reverberation chamber is used to evaluate the emissions and immunity of electronic devices in the frequency range of 80MHz to 18GHz, and

is located next to an anechoic chamber at the University Multispectral Laboratories at OSU's Richmond Hills complex. There are only six locations in the United States where this combination of testing can be accomplished in one location. Headquartered in Cedar Park, Texas, ETS-Lindgren has manufacturing facilities in North America, Europe and Asia.

--OSU-OKC received a \$115,000 gift from the Kirkpatrick Foundation for a Smart Classroom in the Veterinary Technology department in the new Agriculture Resource Center.

--ExxonMobil Corporation announced that OSU will be one of 84 colleges and universities to receive an unrestricted grant of \$45,000, which is a portion of the total \$1.7 million being contributed nationwide to support various academic programs that help prepare students to enter the workforce.

OSU provides the state's only nationally accredited graduate-level programs in counseling.

--The Cat Room—a feature of the Small Animal Clinic Critical Care Unit upgrade—has been named with a gift from Jack and Joyce Stuteville in Kingfisher. The room is named in memory of Jack's Aunt Verna Stuteville, an avid cat enthusiast.

--A neonatal foal stall has been named in the Equine Critical Care Unit. The Herthel Family of Alamo Pintado Equine Clinic in California gave a \$10,000 naming gift. --Hills Pet Nutrition presented the Center for Veterinary Health Sciences with a \$25,000 check for the expansion of facilities and programs for instruction in oral communication using simulated client interviews. This gift will enable the purchase and installation the necessary equipment for the existing conference room in the Veterinary Medicine Library.
