OSU-Oklahoma City will celebrate its 43rd Annual Commencement Ceremony Monday at the Cox Convention Center. The program begins at 7:30 p.m. Dave Lopez, president of Downtown Oklahoma City, Inc., will deliver the keynote address to the more than 500 graduates. Before joining Downtown OKC, Inc., Lopez was president of SBC Communications' Oklahoma operations.

OSU students earn journalism awards

Two news-editorial students won awards at the Society of Professional Journalists Region 8 conference in Oklahoma City on April 30. John Estus, a graduating senior from Tulsa, won first place in the general news category of the SPJ Mark of Excellence Awards for his investigation of a Stillwater housing program. His entry now will be judged in the national competition against 11 other regional winners in that division. Matt Barnard, a senior from Stillwater, won third place in the sports photography category. The SPJ Mark of Excellence honors the best in student journalism. In Region 8, Estus and Barnard competed against college journalists from Oklahoma and Texas.

Faculty member receives international teaching award

Tim Faltyn, Arts and Sciences division head at OSU-Oklahoma City, recently received the 17th Annual International Excellence in Teaching and Learning Award. Faltyn is a teacher by trade even though it didn't start out that way. He began his career in the non-profit sector of Oklahoma government. Named Carnegie United States Professor of the Year in 2000, Faltyn has authored nine books on American government, Oklahoma government, educational motivation and golf. He says the favorite part of his day is in the classroom. The award honors those who use innovative strategies, such as interactive and cooperative learning, combined with the use of technology to support higher education learning.

"School Reform in a Global Society"

OSU professor William Segall has authored a book that insists the underlying purpose of certain educational programs is to pressure schools to teach students that corporate success, not personal success, should be their only value. "Today, students are continually tested to see if they are learning what the business world wants

them to know," he said. "All businesses want schools to do is teach students to become good workers and schools are supposed to supply corporations the workers they need." In his book, "School Reform in a Global Society," Segall has outlined what has happened, why it is happening, and to whom it is happening from an educational, economic, and historical perspective. His book is now available in bookstores throughout the country.
