OSU alum named "Teacher of the Year" in Stillwater

Jayne Ann Williamson with Sangre Ridge Elementary School has been named Stillwater Public Schools' 2006 Teacher of the Year. Williamson was awarded the \$500 Larry Gish Memorial Award from the Stillwater Public Education Foundation and an engraved plate from Dearinger's Printing. A 1989 OSU elementary education graduate, Williamson has taught in Stillwater schools for nine years, six of those years as a gifted education specialist at various elementary schools and the last three as an "all subjects" teacher for 4th graders at Sangre Ridge. A member of Alpha Chi Omega Sorority, Williamson is the spouse of Bruce Williamson, who is also an alum and works as a support manager in OSU Financial Information Management.

Wind Ensemble to make rare appearance in Japan

The Oklahoma State University Wind Ensemble is in Japan this week for a rare performance at the 37th Annual Yamaha All-Japan Band Directors Clinic. It is one of only 10 American bands to perform for the clinic in its 37 years. The OSU ensemble received an invitation for the clinic after professionals of the Japanese musical public reviewed its audition CD from a 2003 performance at the British Association of Symphonic Bands and Wind Ensembles in England. The 53-member ensemble will perform for about 2,500 Japanese musical professionals at the clinic in Hamamatsu, Japan. The group's trip is more like a tour, according to Dr. Joseph Missal, director of bands. The band will hold multiple rehearsals in Japan that are open to the public and perform another concert in Tokyo.

Wellness tip: Beat hypertension with more walking

Have high blood pressure? Exercise often helps. Consult your doctor and consider wearing a pedometer. It measures the number of steps or the distance you move each day. It tracks both structured exercise and everyday activity. One mile is usually 2000-2500 steps depending on stride length. Start sensibly and gradually increase your steps or distance. 8,000 to 10,000 steps per day is a great target. In six months, changes in your blood pressure and even in your weight may pleasantly surprise you.
