Drs. Steven Harrist and Shelia Kennison will be among the invited speakers on the topic of "the psychology of the child" at the latest Oxford Round Table set for next week at the Harris Manchester College at the University of Oxford, England. The round table series provides a collegial "think-tank" atmosphere to promote human advancement and understanding through the improvement of education. Harrist, associate professor in the School of Applied Health and Educational Psychology, will present "Self and Other: Tensions within Liberal Individualism and Moral Education." Kennison, associate professor in the Department of Psychology, will present "Learning to Read: Why Children in the U.S. Read Less Well than Children in Other English-Speaking Countries."

Schmidly to lecture OSU students at Cambridge

Also in England, about 15 OSU students are currently participating in the Cambridge summer program. OSU System CEO and President David Schmidly will present a lecture Monday titled "Charles Darwin and Evolution: The Idea that Changed our View of the World." He also will participate in a panel on leadership and public service with Louis Blair, former executive secretary of the Truman Foundation, and Bryan Begley, former OSU Truman Scholar and currently an executive with McKinsey Consulting. In addition, Arts and Sciences Dean Peter Sherwood will lecture and lead a tour, OSU English professor Edward Jones will lead a course on 17th century British newsbooks, and the students will tour the home of Charles Darwin. OSU alumni also are participating in the activities and this weekend a first-ever alumni event will be held.

Professor captures national award for book "Waiting for Elvis"

Congratulations to Dr. Toni Graham for winning the John Gardner Book Award for 2006 for her work Waiting for Elvis. The work of fiction is prompting positive reviews from many of the critics, including the New York Times. Graham, a native of San Francisco, is an associate professor of English at OSU. Her first book, The Daiquiri Girls, was the winner of the Associated Writing Programs Award for Short Fiction. Her stories have also appeared in several magazines.

KOSU: Oklahoma and beyond

KOSU has added another radio frequency and now has the potential to reach more than 4 million people in Oklahoma as well as parts of Missouri, Arkansas and Kansas. The latest frequency, 107.3 FM, serves the Tulsa metropolitan area and amounts to KOSU's fourth frequency, which includes 91.7 FM for central Oklahoma, 107.5 FM for northeast Oklahoma, and 101.9 FM for the Okmulgee area. The latest frequency is part of a five-point effort begun in January of 2005 to improve service in all directions. The next Oklahoma Public Radio service expansion initiative includes the use of a new High Definition "HD" technology, which will allow for additional programming options for listeners, and improved signal strength in north central Oklahoma.
