# Dean Knaub to step down

After 17 years as dean of the College of Human Environmental Sciences, Dr. Patricia K. Knaub has announced her intention to step down from the post at Oklahoma State University effective June 30, 2007. Knaub confirmed that decision in a recent letter to OSU Senior Vice President and Provost Dr. Marlene Strathe. "Because the college is well positioned for the future, this seems like a good time for me to focus on new opportunities," said Knaub, who has overseen sweeping changes at the institution. OSU System CEO and President David Schmidly said, "Pat has been an extremely gifted leader and ambassador for Oklahoma State University and HES. We appreciate all she has done to elevate her college, making HES a national leader. We wish her the very best and know she will continue to make valuable contributions to OSU." Under Knaub's direction, the college experienced a 98 percent increase in undergraduate enrollment and a 50 percent increase in graduate students over the last 12 years. # Undergrad awarded fellowship

Congratulations to Ryan Trojan of OSU. The American Society for Microbiology has selected Trojan as a 2006 award recipient for a Microbiology Undergraduate Research Fellowship. Microbiology Fellows have the opportunity to conduct full time summer research at their home institution or at a host U.S. institution. Each fellow receives a \$3,500 stipend and reimbursement for travel expenses to the 2007 ASM general meeting. Edward Shaw from OSU is Ryan's mentor. The title of Ryan's research is "Expression of genes unique to the QpH1 plasmid of Coxiella burnetti during infection of host cells."

#### Center debuts film series

OSU's Center for Africana Studies and Development will host the "Darubini Africa" film series this semester, starting with a screening tomorrow (Wednesday) of "The Battle of Adwa." Political science professor Ted Vestal will introduce the film at 7 p.m. in 106 Noble Research Center and lead a discussion afterward. "The Battle of Adwa" is a documentary that examines Emperor Menelik II's military defeat of Italian colonizers, securing Ethiopia international recognition as an independent state. Vestal, an internationally recognized scholar of Ethiopian politics, will draw connections between the watershed event and 20th century world history and discuss the unique relationship Menelik's son established with OSU. This is the first of four films in the series that will be screened this semester.
