The two-day event includes a day of discussion with graduates from McNair programs currently attending OSU graduate programs, plus visits to departments, concluding with the scholars presenting their original research. All undergraduates in the program are required to conduct intensive research in their area of interest and to pursue a graduate degree.

Helmerich Browsing Room. Depository libraries safeguard the public's right to know by collecting, organizing, preserving and assisting users with information from the Federal Government. The OSU Library became a Federal Depository in 1907 by an act of Congress; in 1979, OSU was elevated to Regional Federal Depository status. It is one of only 52 libraries designated to receive all publicly available federal documents.
