Oklahoma can expect slower job growth in 2007

Oklahoma added 28,800 jobs this year for overall job growth of 1.9 percent, continuing a broad based expansion that's expected to be slightly slower in 2007, according to the latest statewide forecast released by the Center for Applied Economic Research at Oklahoma State University's Spears School of Business. The forecast shows Oklahoma can expect 17,900 new jobs in 2007, a 1.2 percent gain. It indicates that the state's energy sector is the most likely reason job growth has outpaced the national average for the last few years. Precision farming research efforts at OSU honored nationally

Faculty and grad students from the Department of Plant and Soil Sciences presented 31 oral and/or poster research presentations at the recent annual Meeting of the American Society of Agronomy, Crop Science and Soil Science Societies of America held in Indianapolis. Regents Professor Bill Raun was recognized with the Werner L. Nelson Award for Diagnosis of Yield-Limiting Factors. Raun and others have developed spectral indices that predict in-season wheat and corn yields and adjust for fertilizer rates using sensor-based technology. Jeff Edwards, extension small grains specialist, and several other faculty contributors received the ASA Educational Materials Award for the No-Till Wheat Production fact sheet. Student Anthony Ruiz, a senior from Mannsville, won first in the speech contest; senior Jessica Sheffield from Fort Gibson placed third in the visual presentation contest; and senior Clint Wilcox from Fairview was named chair, Research Symposium Section, for next year.

OSU-Okmulgee inks agreement with corporate partner

At a time when nearly 22,000 positions for heating, ventilating and air conditioning (HVAC) technicians are unfilled nationwide, Oklahoma State University-Okmulgee is forming a partnership with Johnson Controls, Inc. to increase the number of skilled HVAC graduates entering the workforce. The collaborative program, called CAREERCONNECT, was formalized in a recent signing by representatives of Johnson Controls and OSU-Okmulgee. The company's contributions to OSU-Okmulgee include scholarships, instruction from industry experts, learning materials and faculty training.
