'Blast from the past' just ahead

Time will turn back 80 years for a few hours Wednesday, March 28, when Oklahoma State University's Division of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources opens a time capsule that was placed in the cornerstone of the recently demolished Dairy Science Building. The unveiling of the time capsule's contents will take place at 11 a.m. in the Kerr Auditorium of the Oklahoma Food and Agricultural Products Research and Technology Center at Oklahoma State University, located at the corner of Monroe St. and Farm Rd. A 10:30 a.m. reception and program will precede the opening. In 1928, the placing of the time capsule in the then-under-construction building dominated the front page of the university newspaper, which listed the capsule contents as including, "names of the dedication committee, copies of state papers and a copy of the university newspaper."

OSU seeks energy managers to jumpstart campus-wide conservation

Oklahoma State University is searching for energy managers for each of its campuses as the key first step in a comprehensive energy conservation initiative expected to save the OSU System more than \$30 million over the next seven years. OSU will hire eight energy managers to guide implementation of a customized, multi-year conservation education program developed in partnership with national leader Energy Education Inc. (EEI). Approved in January by the OSU/A&M College Board of Regents, the partnership with EEI is part of OSU's efforts to prevent escalating utility costs from encumbering its educational pursuits and mission. A centerpiece of our overall initiative will be the selection and training of energy managers at every OSU campus who will collaborate with EEI's engineers, heating and air conditioning specialists and other professionals to bring about the most effective and efficient energy use in all of our buildings and systems. Foundation funds OSU sports media professorship and legislative coverage

The Ethics and Excellence Foundation has given a total of \$321,000 to fund an endowed professorship in sports media at OSU and strengthen news coverage at KOSU. The \$250,000 gift to establish the professorship is the Foundation's largest gift to OSU and brings its total support for the university to more than \$625,000 since 1985. The professorship will serve as a cornerstone for the sports media program, which gained formal approval from the OSU Board of Regents in the fall of 2006. Previous funding from the Ethics and Excellence in Journalism Foundation helped lay important foundational elements that made the program possible. The \$71,000 to KOSU will be used to expand the station's coverage of ongoing legislative activity in Oklahoma through the State Capitol Report. The late Edith Kinney Gaylord established the Ethics and Excellence in Journalism Foundation in 1982 to support projects improving the quality and ethical standards of journalism.

Holocaust survivor to tell story of hope

OSU Women's Programs will host a free lecture by Holocaust survivor Rosa Blum, "The Will to Live: A Story of Survival," Tuesday, March 27, from 2 – 3 p.m. at the Student Union Theater. Born in Romania, Blum was relocated with her family to the ghettos in 1944, and later, the extermination camps Auschwitz and Dachau. Her inspiring story includes an impassioned message of hope. The event is sponsored by OSU's Women's Studies

program, Sociology Department, Women's Resource Center and Minority Women's Association, the Stillwater Public Library and the National Organization of Women.

World premier of music documentary at OSU

A documentary titled "The Conjoining of Ancient Song" will be premiered at 7 p.m. Tuesday, March 27 in the Student Union Theater. Created by Willie Ruff of Yale University and Dr. Hugh Foley of Rogers State University, this film explores the migration of the "lining out" tradition of sacred singing from 16th-Century England and Scotland to Indian Territory. Learn the fascinating story of this tri-cultural musical production, which blends elements of African American spirituals, Anglo hymnody and theology, and the Muscogee language. Ruff and Foley will discuss the production of the documentary and field questions. The event is free and open to the public. Visiting lecturer on Islamic studies to speak

Professor Robert Dankoff of the University of Chicago Center for Islamic Studies will speak on "The Persian Art of the Book and the Use of Visual Images in the Islamic World," on Tuesday, March 27, 7:30 p.m. at the Wes Watkins Auditorium. The 15th annual Converse Memorial Lectureship presentation focuses on traditional Persian calligraphy and manuscript illuminations, placing them in the context of Islamic religion and culture and answering the question of whether certain visual images were always regarded as forbidden in the Islamic world. It will also show common ground between Islamic and Western traditions through writers' and artists' handling of the Biblical character of Joseph. The lecture series commemorates the life and career of Hyla S. Converse, a beloved humanities and religious studies teacher who died in 1990.

Economy slow but okay

While the state's economy has slowed lately, it is still in good shape. That was the message from Dr. W. Gary Simpson from the Spears School of Business during a recent panel discussion before the Oklahoma Bankers Association. Simpson, Oklahoma Bankers Association Chair of Commercial Bank Management and professor of finance, was quoted in an Oklahoman article that showed his assessment was in agreement with the findings of the association's latest survey. Simpson was joined on the panel by the state banking commissioner, president of the Oklahoma Bankers Association, and vice president of the Kansas Fed in Oklahoma City.
