## OSU among top 90 "best value" public institutions

The Princeton Review is again listing Oklahoma State University as one of the nation's best value undergraduate institutions in its latest edition of "America's Best Value Colleges," which went on sale this week. The Review selected the schools based on four categories: academics, tuition GPA (the sticker price minus average amount students receive in scholarships and grants), financial aid (how well colleges meet students' financial need), and student borrowing. OSU was among the 90 public colleges chosen for this edition, all of which The Princeton Review recommends as "America's best college education deals for 2007." The book includes three pages on OSU that explain each category and offer an overview of the university.

## OSU researcher featured at energy conference

Raymond Huhnke, OSU professor of biosystems and agricultural engineering, was among the experts on the alternative fuels panel at this week's OSU Energy Conference in Tulsa. He serves as team leader for a project that is working to convert low cost biomass, such as perennial grasses and crop residues, into liquid fuel known as "GRASSohol." Huhnke's team is using a gasification-fermentation process designed to get three units of energy from every one unit that is input. The Energy Conference, hosted by the Spears School of Business at OSU, drew more than 800 to the Renaissance Hotel where the theme was the continued diversification of the energy industry. The keynote speaker for the conference, John Hofmeister, president, Shell Oil, urged participants to diversify their companies and pointed to Shell's sizeable investments in alternative energy sources as a sign that his company intends to lead the way.
