OSU professors named ASAS Fellows

The American Society of Animal Science has bestowed its highest honor, the title of "Fellow," on Donald G. Wagner and Bob Wettemann of Oklahoma State University. Essentially a lifetime achievement award, the title is reserved for those recognized for their scientific achievements and service to the nation's livestock industry over the course of their career. Wagner has served as animal science department head since 1990. Under his leadership, the department became the largest undergraduate major and scholarship program at OSU and developed state-of-the-art beef cattle and swine research facilities. Wettemann, an OSU Regents Professor, has focused his research on endocrine mechanisms that control reproductive processes and methods to improve efficiency of beef cattle. A major effect of his research has been to establish that body condition can be used to evaluate supplemental feeding programs of beef cows. The name change is in honor of the late senator's role in the conception and development of the FAPC. Sen. Kerr was the legislative champion in the two-decade effort to create the state-of-the-art research and technology center. In 1994, Kerr's efforts were rewarded when his bill to develop the FAPC was unanimously approved by both houses of the legislature and signed by the governor. The FAPC opened for business in early 1997. In 10 years of service to Oklahoma, the FAPC has assisted more than 1,000 Oklahoma clients through 3,000 technical and business projects. Rise School of Stillwater to offer unique benefits

The nation's seventh Rise School will open in Stillwater this fall thanks to state officials and others who have made it possible to bring the national flagship program for children with disabilities to Oklahoma. The school, which will be located at Stillwater Head Start until a permanent location is built, will partner closely with Oklahoma State University. Each classroom will be staffed with a teacher with a master's degree and experience in teaching children with disabilities as well as two full-time teaching assistants from OSU. The goal for children in the Rise School is to receive personal attention from teachers, special curriculum and specific intervention therapies that will ultimately allow each to graduate with a high school degree. The seed funding to start the process for developing the Rise School came in part from a \$425,000 gift from T. Boone Pickens to the Mya Gonzales Foundation last November. Stiegler to retire, reception tomorrow

Dr. James H. Stiegler, professor and head of the Department of Plant and Soil Sciences at Oklahoma State University, will retire July 31, after 36 years in academia as both an administrator and as a state extension specialist. He has been the department head since January 2001 and served as interim head in 1990 and 2000. His career at OSU also included serving as soil management extension specialist, extension turf specialist and extension soybean specialist at various times during his career. Stiegler is widely recognized for his expertise in soils, soil management, and conservation tillage and was an early proponent of no-till farming in Oklahoma. He is also well known around the country for his educational leadership in land judging and as coordinator of the National Land Judging Contest that is held in Oklahoma City—an event that attracts over 1000 4-H and FFA youth from across the U.S. each year. A reception in Stiegler's honor is planned for tomorrow (Friday, July 20) from 2-4 p.m. in the Noble Research Center Atrium.
