## OSU students win big with "Cold Bottle Designs"

Oklahoma State University seniors Joseph Pruitt and Blake Ferrell have won big, earning the \$20,000 top prize at the statewide Governor's Cup competition for a concept and business plan that could help change the way cold drinks are bottled. Finalists and winners were recognized at an April 20 banquet in Oklahoma

The Stillwater natives placed first in the undergraduate division of the entrepreneurial competition with a proposal for an insulated, environmentally-friendly, disposable bottle that keeps beverages cold much longer than existing containers.

"For example, the bottle of Coke you buy at the convenience store will have extra insulation already built in that will keep your beverage cold for up to four times longer," said Pruitt. "The beautiful thing about the bottle is that you don't have to pay any extra for it because no new equipment is needed in making the improved product."

Pruitt, a mechanical and aerospace engineering major at OSU, came up with the idea for "Cold Bottle Designs" while employed as an intern with Stillwater research and development firm Strategic Solutions International, LLC. He enlisted one-time roommate Ferrell, an accounting major, to help write the business plan. The technology allows plastic bottle manufacturers to add thermal insulation

to disposable beverage bottles with no additional equipment or production costs. A provisional patent application that includes Pruitt's name was filed by SSI on the concept in November 2005, and a Patent Cooperative Treaty application was filed in February 2006.

Both Pruitt and Ferrell say winning the contest was an excellent promotion of the Cold Bottle concept and may help in its business development.

"We've made some great contacts already with people in industry that wouldn't have been possible without the Governor's Cup," Pruitt said.

Ferrell added, "The feedback has been very positive. The Governor's Cup has been a great experience that could possibly help lead to bigger and better things for Cold Bottle Designs in the very near future."

Dr. Tom Brown, Ardmore Professor of Business Administration and professor of marketing in the Spears School of Business at OSU, served as competition advisor for Pruitt and Ferrell.

"I really wish I could take some credit for what these young men have accomplished, but my job was mostly to just stay out of their way." Brown said. "This is a remarkable achievement for

Designed to instill the lesson that innovations leading to new business are valued and lucrative, the Governor's Cup competition is

funded by the Donald W. Reynolds Foundation, a national philanthropic organization founded in 1954 by the late media entrepreneur. i2E Inc., a private not for profit corporation, manages the entrepreneurial contest.

## <u>Perspective</u>

### To OSU students, faculty and staff...



As I wrote earlier this month, the Oklahoma legislature is working with a record revenue surplus this year and we had hoped it would fund higher education at a level that would allow us to address a number of priorities, such as growing our faculty, while holding down any tuition increase for students. It is a golden opportunity to make a real impact, but I continue to have serious concerns.

There are many important and deserving needs in our state, but I can't think of a wiser investment than higher education. Beyond funding increased mandatory costs, Oklahoma is in a position to support higher education at a level that would help increase the number of college graduates, make our colleges and universities stronger and thereby bolster our state economy.

The House has passed a bill that calls for only \$24 million in new money for higher education; an amount that provides no money to address mandatory costs. The Senate bill is much better, calling for \$87 million in new funding for state universities and colleges. The Senate plan would mean about \$7.7 million in appropriations for OSU and would cover our mandatory cost increases – utilities, health insurance, retirement benefits and other expenses.

Better yet, the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education has requested \$123.1 million in new funding to assure continued quality, access and affordability for college students. This plan provides the funding to increase faculty and staff pay, add faculty positions, upgrade technology and enhance the quality of a college

Most importantly, it would help limit any tuition increase for students and their families and could make more money available for student financial aid at a time of rising student loan rates. It is a plan that can have a huge impact

We recognize the difficult task our legislators face and appreciate all they have done in recent years for higher education. This is an urgent matter for all of us. It is not too late for state leaders to hear from us. Students, please encourage your parents to contact their legislators. To staff and faculty, I urge you to contact your legislators as well.

We will not have final appropriation figures until this summer and will provide details about tuition and fees and faculty and staff pay as soon as we can.

As the school year comes to a close, I want to say how proud I am of what we have achieved. To our students, I want to commend you on all you have accomplished. Have a safe and productive summer. I want to congratulate our graduating seniors on earning an OSU degree. It is a firstclass ticket to a successful career and future.

To our faculty, thank you for all your hard work and passion as you inspire and help our students grow. To our staff, we truly appreciate all that you do each and every day to make OSU one of the best college experiences in the nation.

To the entire Oklahoma State University family, thanks again for another historic year. I'm even more excited about the future and look forward to even greater things ahead.

# OSU students rule the skies again

Independent teams representing OSU's School of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering placed first and second for the third consecutive year in the annual AIAA International Student Design/Build/Fly Competition. Sponsored by the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, the Office of Naval Research and Cessna, this year's contest at Cessna's airfield in Wichita this weekend featured 48 university teams from North America and Europe.

Participating in the competition for nine of its 10 years, OSU teams placed first and third in 2001 and, in 2004, became the first from the same university to take both of the top spots. OSU mechanical and aerospace engineering students also took first and second in 2005.

"Simultaneously taking first and second in this contest is an accomplishment no other university can claim, and OSU has now done it three years in a row," said Dr. Andy Arena, Maciula

Professor of engineering at OSU and the teams' faculty adviser. "I am so proud of our students, especially considering the level of competition."

OSU's entries were the lightest planes in the competition, and the teams recorded the top technical report scores and fastest cargo loading and unloading times. In successfully completing the missions, both planes carried payloads almost twice their weight, a structural efficiency feat at any level of design.

## Campus Master Plan

Project: Donald W. Reynolds Architecture Building, which will expand and enhance facilities for OSU's internationally-renowned School of Architecture.

**Building Specifications:** 45,000 sq. ft. of new space and 37,000 sq. ft. of renovated space. New campus amenities include a 300-seat auditorium, multimedia classrooms, a visualization/computer lab, gallery space and an expanded architectural library. Spaces dedicated to the School of Architecture include new design studio space, a model shop and expanded administrative and multipurpose

Location: Adjacent to the existing architecture building on Athletic Avenue.

Budget: \$14.8 million, funded by a gift from the Donald W. Reynolds Foundation, the single largest to OSU from a private foundation.

Construction: Expected to begin in August 2007 with completion by January 2009.

The campus master plan will guide a historic, unprecedented period of growth at OSU. Of the \$826.4 million in total improvements scheduled in the plan's initial five-year development period, \$314 million is earmarked for academics.

## Helen Clements
