Pregame pageantry to honor Armed Forces

Celebrating the Centennial: **OSU** contributions

The collection of more than 30 works juxtaposed with current pieces and historical images of the art department will remain on display in the Gardiner Art Gallery at the Bartlett Center through Nov. 9. The gallery is open to the public Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Pageantry honoring men and women of the U.S. Armed Forces will precede the OSU-Texas football game at Boone Pickens Stadium.

The event will be an opportunity for fans to acknowledge the service and sacrifices of people such as Cpl. Kristopher McVay and 1st Lt. Morgan Ashworth. The OSU students and Army Reservists with the 486th Civil Affairs Battalion in Tulsa were awarded Bronze Stars in Iraq on Friday, Oct. 26.

Ashworth and McVay are part of a fiveman team from the 486th assigned to the 1/9 Infantry Manchu, an Army active duty component stationed at Camp Corregidor in Ramadi in Iraq's Anbar Province, a bloody center of the insurgency. As members of the 486th, they assist in the search for insurgents and weapons and explosives caches by leading interactions between locals and the 1/9th, a regiment recognized as a Unit of Valor for its exploits in Anbar Province.

McVay, a transfer student from Freedom, Okla., was responsible for the arrest of a major al Qaeda supporter. McVay discovered the senior terrorist hiding in a residence and recognized him as a man appearing on most wanted lists for funneling \$300,000 each month into Ramadi to support the insurgency.

Ashworth, an animal science doctoral student from Lone Grove, Okla., received his second Bronze Star for valor for retrieving wounded fellow soldiers while under fire during a raid engaged by insurgents last February in the MaLaab district of eastern Ramadi. His bravery and devotion to duty contributed to the saving of five lives during the ambush.

According to an Army Recommendation of Award certificate: "Ashworth, without regards to his safety ran under heavy machine gun fire into the open street and carried a severely wounded Iraqi soldier to immediate cover, and (began) rendering first aid while still under direct fire from the enemy.

"Enemy machine gun fire was still producing coalition casualties; therefore, 1st Lt. Ashworth determined that a vacant house was to be used for casualty collection and as a strongpoint," wrote Master Sgt. Charles E. Smith, who nominated Ashworth for the

Inside the strongpoint, Ashworth began treating wounded soldiers and triaging patients until a combat medic arrived. He exposed himself to heavy machine gun fire two more times carrying wounded.

McVay and Ashworth's unit has been in Iraq since November 2006. They will return stateside later this month.

Pregame festivities Saturday will include an appearance by Challenger, the first bald eagle in U.S. history trained to free-fly into major league sports stadiums, during the National Anthem.

In addition, OSU has planned a fly-over featuring four F-16 "Fighting Falcon" aircraft piloted by OSU alums from the Oklahoma Air National Guard's 138th Fighter Wing.

University Health Services accreditation renewed

OSU University Health Services has achieved accreditation by the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care, its fifth consecutive three-year accreditation award dating to 1995.

According to UHS director Steve Rogers, status as an accredited organization means UHS has passed a series of rigorous and nationally recognized standards for the provision of quality health care. Ambulatory health care organizations seeking accreditation by the AAAHC undergo an extensive on-site, peerbased survey of its facilities and services.

"Accreditation underscores our long-standing commitment to providing the highest possible levels of quality care to the community we serve," Rogers said. "We are pleased and proud to have our efforts recognized with this

More than 3,000 ambulatory health care organizations throughout the United States are accredited by the AAAHC. Among the types of organizations that can seek AAAHC accreditation are ambulatory and office-based surgery centers, single and multi-specialty group practices, college health centers, dental group practices, community health centers, occupational health centers and managed care organizations.

University Health Services is the ambulatory care facility on OSU's Stillwater campus for students who become ill or injured. Its staff of 40 that includes six physicians and a physician associate, 13 nurses and other health professionals handle more than 26,000 medical visits each year.

Vet-med and CASNR honor distinguished alumni

A total of 271 students have received AT&T/OSU Presidential Transfer Scholarships to attend OSU for the 2007-08 academic year. The AT&T/OSU Presidential Transfer Scholars were awarded scholarships ranging from

\$750 to \$2,000 per year for up to two years. The awards are part of a \$3 million AT&T Foundation Grant to OSU that funds one of the largest college student transfer programs in Oklahoma.
