Excluding the service academies, OSU ranks second among higher education institutions in the number of graduates to attain the rank of

general or admiral in the Armed Forces. In peacetime and every conflict since World War I, alumni like 1917 graduate Lt. Gen. George Price Hays have served the nation with distinction.

Hays was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, the Distinguished Service Cross and the French Croix De Guerre for acts of bravery in World War I. He also served as a commander during World War II and continued his military service before his death and burial at Arlington National Cemetery in 1978.

Mitchell completed a bachelor's in business education at OSU in 1972 before becoming a teacher and eventually co-founding a telecommunications company that grew to 8,500 employees.

Humphreys graduated from the College of Engineering, Architecture and Technology in 1971 with a bachelor's in industrial engineering and management. He now helps guide one of the world's largest corporations as a member of its management committee.

Also tonight, the Spears School of Business will recognize Karl Bovee ('91), Ernest "Trip" Kuehne III ('95) and Heather Wallace ('96) as its 2007 Outstanding Young Alumni.

# **Results in from CodeRed test**

The recent test of CodeRed revealed the system can greatly complement other systems OSU is putting in place for critical emergency communications.

The university learned during an Oct.

25 test that emergency alert texts or voicemails reached approximately 90 percent of classrooms occupied dur-



ing the Thursday afternoon broadcast. The simulation also revealed hurdles to delivering vital information to more than 20,000 individuals quickly and simultaneously that system provider CodeRed and the university are working to overcome.

Delivery of voice alerts was successful, with calls placed to more than 7,000 mobile phones in 13 minutes. A number of recipients did not recognize CodeRed's 866-419-5000 number, however, and did not immediately answer.

There was a delay in delivering more than 8,200 text alerts due to changes in cell phone carrier addresses and delays by some providers. OSU is working with CodeRed to address these issues.

For the system to be most effective, students, faculty and staff are encouraged to keep their contact information up to date. To update contact information or sign up for CodeRed emergency alerts, log on to your O-Key account and click "Emergency Contacts."

In the event of an emergency, OSU will use a number of methods to disseminate information.

While public address capabilities in hightraffic buildings on campus and over the community siren system may reach large groups, the reverse-911 system can deliver a text message or voice alert to just one person that can be life-saving for many.

# **Cessation starts** with Smokeout

Here's a smoke signal: harmful effects from smoking account for approximately one in five deaths each year, according to the Center for Disease Control.

OSU's decision to go tobacco free July 1, 2008, as part of efforts to become the healthiest campus in America has prompted the Seretean Wellness Center to expand cessation assistance to students, faculty and staff. Building on the momentum of recent programs and service enhancements funded with a \$500,000 grant from the Oklahoma Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust, the center will lead the Stillwater campus in observing the 31st annual Great American Smokeout on Nov. 15.

Sponsored by the American Cancer Society, the smokeout is held the third Thursday in November and encourages smokers to quit for the day and, hopefully, forever, according to Robin Purdie, Seretean Wellness Center director.

"The Great American Smokeout gives smokers a day to quit when they know other people from all over the nation will be joining them," Purdie said. "Support is essential for an individual to quit smoking, and we help provide that here at OSU."

Before the smokeout, a Share the W.E.A.L.T.H. (Wellness Educators Advocating Lifestyles Toward Health) booth will be set up Nov. 13 and 14 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the OSU Student Union. The peer health education team will distribute "cold-turkey" sandwiches and free "Help You Quit Smoking" packets containing toothpicks, gum, rubber bands and mints as well as educational information.


"Our goal is to help the maximum number of people who want to quit," Yvon Fils-Aime, tobacco health educator who recently joined the Seretean Wellness Center staff. "We're here to help fight the habit with education, medical assistance and support."


## **Mechanical Engineering Technology** department, Engineering
