OSU men's golf team, coached The Cowboys were led in scoring by Jonathan Moore, championship, becoming the first OSU player to claim the Howell in 2000.




"The Scowl," OSU's entry in the concrete canoe competition, raced across Boomer Lake on June 17. The team placed 11th overall in the national competition.
